



Project Examples

Technology Services

The Mississippi Library Commission (MLC) provided free technical assistance, training and consulting to public libraries on various technology issues. MLC supported libraries across the state with issues related to local networks, PCs, servers, and internet circuits, email and website hosting, troubleshooting network and computer issues. MLC also maintained a wide area network through help desk tickets and helped libraries navigate the E-Rate program for internet discounts. Many libraries in Mississippi are unable to afford IT services and have computers and other electronic items in need of service. This program allowed professional IT technicians to travel to those locations to fix broken equipment and upgrade systems to improve services to libraries and their patrons.

IMLS Funds: \$312,424.01



The Mississippi Library Commission (MLC) awarded CARES Act funds to 23 public libraries to purchase technology supplies and materials that would respond to the COVID-19 pandemic. The stimulus funds allowed many library systems to continue offering safe, effective services to their communities without contributing to the spread of the virus. One library system reported that new laptops and webcams allowed patrons to access library internet while remaining socially distanced, and staff were able to continue providing virtual services. Another system purchased laptops for patron checkout, which saw significant use. From enabling virtual legal consultations to providing emergency back-ups for home computer crashes, the equipment impacted individuals and communities in many ways.

Reading Programs--Center for the Book

The Mississippi Center for the Book of the Mississippi Library Commission (MLC), developed and maintained annual reading programs for adults as well as other reading programs. The Center for the Book also participated in partnerships for community engagement opportunities, such as the Mississippi Book Festival and the development of a Mississippi Literary Map. To increase the capacity of Mississippi libraries to offer programming, the Center for the Book created Book Club in a Box and other kits for statewide checkout, containing items such as LEGOs, art kits, video game kits, and STEM kits.

IMLS Funds: \$4,440.68
